Goodman's proposal became the theoretical basis for a new approach to teaching reading that would soon take hold in American schools. Previously, the question of how to teach reading had focused on one of two basic ideas. One idea is that reading is a visual memory process. The teaching method associated with this idea is known as "whole word."

Thus, the teacher's role in the Balanced Literacy Approach is to scaffold literacy learning, that is, to actively enhance students' understanding while they read. Using Balanced Literacy in the ELA Classroom

It is important to evaluate children's reading competence in many ways. A 2005 Australian National Inquiry into the Teaching of Literacy supported this balanced approach, with the use of synthetic phonics recommended in the first couple of years of schooling for beginning readers. Similarly, the UK 2006 reading review recognized:

Reading is the process of constructing meaning from text, whether written or graphic, paper-based or digital. It is a purposeful, thinking act and meaning is always at its core. There has been disagreement in the past over the correct way to teach reading, but a balanced approach is now generally accepted.

Balanced reading instruction usually means a combination of whole language and phonics approaches. Researchers and practitioners alike assert that children need training in both phonemic awareness--by which they develop an awareness of individual sounds--and in cueing strategies--through which they learn to decode the text and comprehend the material (Kelly, 1997).

Further benefits of this approach are described on page 7 of *Guided Reading: Years 5 to 8*. Guided reading and shared reading have much in common. Both approaches aim to make reading

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purposeful and enjoyable for students by helping them make meaning from texts, deepening their comprehension, and developing their critical-thinking skills.

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
