What is a third or fourth degree tear? This is a type of tear sustained during vaginal childbirth which involves the tissue of the vagina, the perineum (the area between the vagina and the anus), and the structures around the anus. If the tear involves the muscles around the anus it is called a third degree tear.

Perineal tears are common during vaginal births, but most do not cause significant injury. Third and fourth degree perineal tears are more serious tears - they extend from the perineum to the anus or rectum and include the muscle that controls the opening and closing of the anus (anal sphincter). 1

If third or fourth degree perineal tears are identified and properly surgically managed, most women will recover well without any bowel control problems. What is the difference between an episiotomy and a tear? An episiotomy is a surgical cut made through the vaginal wall and perineum to make more space to deliver the baby.

Most women will have a normal vaginal birth after a 3rdor 4th degree tear. Your risk of a 3rdor 4th degree tear occurring again is increased if: • You have had a 4th degree tear previously • Instruments (vacuum and forceps) are required to assist with the birth • Your baby weighs more than 4kg

Third and fourth degree perineal tears - Queensland Health

A third-degree tear is an injury to the perineum involving the anal sphincter (muscle controlling the anus), and a fourth-degree tear involves the anal sphincter and the anal mucosa (the lining of the anus or rectum).1,2

3.5 Third- and fourth-degree perineal tears

Identifying significant predictor factors leading to third or fourth degree perineal tears during vaginal delivery was the objective of this study. METHODS: During a two-year period (1995-1996), a third or fourth degree perineal rupture occurred in 214 women (3.7%) after vaginal delivery.

Third and fourth degree tears are an uncommon complication of childbirth that may affect your bowel, bladder and sexual function for varying amounts of time. A third degree tear is a tear or laceration through the perineal muscles and the muscle layer that surrounds the anal canal.

Recovering from third and fourth degree perineal tears ...

Third- or fourth-degree tears, also known as an obstetric anal sphincter injury (OASI), can occur in 6 out of 100 births (6%) for first time mothers and less than 2 in 100 births (2%) of births for women who have had a vaginal birth before. A rectal buttonhole is a rare injury that occurs when the anal sphincter does not tear, but there is a hole ...

Third-degree perineal lacerations reputedly occur in2.2% to 19% of vaginal deliveries in the UnitedStates.1,2 Breakdown of a third- or fourth-degreeperineal repair can lead to incontinence of stool or flatus,rectovaginal fistula, or sexual dysfunction.3,4 Infection atthe operative site occurs in up to 12% of cases,5 and a keyfactor in successful anal sphincter repair is the absence ofinfection.6

Third and fourth degree lacerations after vaginal delivery ...

More than 50% involvement of the vaginal epithelium, perineal skin, perineal muscles and fascia, but no involvement of the anal sphincter. Obstetric Anal Sphincter Tears (OASIS) Third degree This involves disruption of the vaginal epithelium, perineal skin, perineal body and anal sphincter muscles. Whats the difference between 3rd and 4th Degree Perineal ...

• a third degree tear-involves the vaginal wall, perineum and anal sphincter (the muscle that controls the back passage). • a fourth degree tear- as above but which also involves the lining of the back passage. An episiotomy is a cut made by a doctor or midwife through the vaginal wall and perineum to make more space to deliver the baby.

Third and Fourth Degree Perineal Tears & Episiotomy

A higher risk of third- or fourth-degree perineal tears was associated with a maternal age above 25 years, instrumental delivery (forceps and ventouse), especially without episiotomy, Asian ethnicity, a more affluent socio-economic status, higher birthweight, and shoulder dystocia.
